You may have seen Mickey Basile at the Center especially on Tuesday's or Friday's playing poker. Did you know, however, that, like so many of our members, he is a veteran? Mickey was only 18 or 19 when he became a communications specialist with the 4th Marine Division. On February 19, 1945 he landed on Iwo Jima along with 70,000 other Marines in one of the bloodiest and most controversial battles of World War II, and was one of the lucky ones who lived to tell about it. UNEXPECTED HEALTH BENEFITS OF KNITTING & CRAFTING

What common hobby is shared by Madeleine Albright, Goldie Hawn, Russell Crowe and thousands of other men and women across the country? The answer may surprise you. It's knitting; a handicraft that is growing in popularity. Over three-quarters of American households have at least one family member who spends an average of 7.5 hours weekly engaged in some craft, many of whom are knitters.

Besides the obvious advantage of creating useful articles and garments, knitters enjoy a host of health benefits both physical and psychological.

1. Knitting allows you to steep yourself in creativity and forget the stress and anxiety of your day. Being actively engaged in a project about which you are passionate and interested, allows the brain to immerse itself fully in the task, producing a feeling similar to a runner's high.

2. The rhythmic motion of knitting has been proven to change the brain chemistry so as to decrease bad stress hormones and increase the release of such good mood hormones as serotonin and dopamine.

3. The process of learning to knit helps you feel good about yourself and enhances your sense of self esteem. As you master more difficult stitches and patterns, you gain the confidence to try other new things in your life.

4. Crafts like knitting engage both your mind and body, causing optimistic feelings about your life and future. Knitters also tend to be more social and outgoing, especially as they interact with others who share their passion.

So why not take up a craft here at the Center? We offer Knitting and Crocheting, Quilting, Sewing and other crafts. Give them a try and see how your health might benefit from trying something new.

WHY SENIORS ARE CONSIDERED AN EASY FRAUD TARGET

The FBI Common Fraud Schemes webpage provides tips on how you can protect you and your family from fraud. *Senior Citizens especially should be aware of fraud schemes* for the following reasons:

1. Senior citizens are most likely to have a "nest egg," to own their home, and/or to have excellent credit—all of which make them attractive to con artists.

2. People who grew up in the 1930s, 1940s, and 1950s were generally raised to be polite and trusting. Con artists exploit these traits, knowing that it is difficult or impossible for these individuals to say "no" or just hang up the telephone.

3. Older Americans are less likely to report a fraud because they don't know who to report it to, are too ashamed at having been scammed, or don't know they have been scammed. Elderly victims may not report crimes, for example, because they are concerned that relatives may think the victims no longer have the mental capacity to take care of their own financial affairs.

4. When an elderly victim does report the crime, they often make poor witnesses. Con artists know the effects of age on memory, and they are counting on elderly victims not being able to supply enough detailed information to investigators. In addition, the victims' realization that they have been swindled may take weeks—or more likely, months—after contact with the fraudster. This extended time frame makes it even more difficult to remember details from the events.

5. Senior citizens are more interested in and susceptible to products promising increased cognitive function, virility, physical conditioning, anti-cancer properties, and so on. In a country where new cures and vaccinations for old diseases have given every American hope for a long and fruitful life, it is not so unbelievable that the con artists' products can do what they claim.

Solomon is blind-sided, knocked to the floor and taken away. Rosenzweig uses his enormous influence to get Solomon released from jail, but Solomon commences a relentless pursuit to bring Rosenzweig before the courts to answer for war crimes. Solomon finds a young attorney, Catherine Lockhart, to whom he recounts his family's struggles and heroisms during the war, revealing to her that he and Piatek grew up as brothers in the same household.
